• HOMEROOM NAMES.



Students have been learning about their new homeroom names. The Ngake Hub homerooms are based on native birds, Whātaitai have a native tree theme and the Matairangi homerooms are named after animals from the sea. Students have shared some of their ideas below.

Penina, Lila and the Kōwhai students did some art based on Kōwhai flowers.

Kiwi- Asha Patel.

Kiwis can't fly even though they have small wings. They are nocturnal which means they sleep during the day and come out at night-Freya.

Ruru- Molly Hayes.

Ruru are special because they can see in the dark- Artemis Owls are special because they have beautiful feathers Ruru's are nocturnal- Millie

Tūī- Juliet McPhee.

Tūī's can copy your own noise- Yianni Tūī's have a special white bump- Mackenzie Tūī and Ruru are both very smart- Mila

Rimu- Glenys Johnston and Tina Davies.

Our classroom is named after the tall native tree Rimu (Red Pine). It has long spiky droopy leaves that look like seaweed. Rimu (and Limu) mean seaweed in Māori and Pasifika languages. It has bright red berry cones that the Kākāpō love to eat. Like the Rimu tree the children in Rimu class will grow tall and strong in our minds and body.

Kōwhai- Elaine Cooper.

A kōwhai is pretty and yellow. It takes care of others such as native birds like the Tui. It is used in medicine and making things. We looked at what the kōwhai means and it is about growing and learning and having an adventure.

Whai are the stingray. They are curious and friendly. The Maori legend of Whaitere the Enchanted Stingray tells of the young stingray who is separated from her family and becomes the guardian of the ocean. In our class we are curious and kind and want to do what we can to care for our environment and the people in it

Manaia- Lou De Lange.

Manaia means seahorse. Seahorses are an extraordinary type of marine fish known for their long snout, camouflaging ability and the way they move through the water upright. Manaia is also known in Te Ao Māori as a 'guardian' figure. As the senior students at school we have an important job to help look after the younger students, the environment, visitors and each other.

Tohorā- Soazik Dunkin.

We love being in Tohorā. Tohorā is a Māori word that means whales and we call ourselves the pod. We are like a family at school, working together like humpback whales do when they feed using the bubble-net method. Look it up online!

• BIKE AND SCOOTER PARKING.

Our new bike and scooter parking gear is being manufactured now for installation in April. Following work with the Wellington city council during last year we were able to secure funding for the new parking equipment for all hubs. Whātaitai will park outside their new building while Ngake and Matairangi will use the new parking area.

This equipment has the latest design features that protects the bikes and scooters while allowing them to be locked if necessary. There will also be parking for adults cycles inside our grounds near the entrance to the car park. Our intention is to increase the number of students and whānau using bikes and scooters to get to and from school.

• WHĀTAITAI HUB BUILDING REPLACEMENT.

Work on the outside areas around the building continues, the seating area on the West side includes our engraved clay bricks and is nearing completion. Work on the path into the building from Hamilton Road, the new natural grass area on the East side, the nature walk behind the building and new Raupo Street and Hamilton Road gates continues.

When the construction company have finished we will work up the outdoor learning area around the path from the Hamilton Road gate. This will include new planting opportunities. I will update again in the next newsletter as we build toward an opening ceremony before the end of this term.

For the benefit of our new Whānau to the school, below is a brief outline of what C.A.R.E is and what it represents to us at Kilbirnie School.

Several years ago, the staff participated in Professional Development, where we reviewed our Mission Statement and the Values that we thought were important to implement in our school. As a team, we came up with the following acronym, which we felt encompassed all the Values that students should be displaying.

C.A.R.E is an acronym for:

CONFIDENCE (Whakamanawa):

Responsibility, Independence, Curiosity, Innovation

ACHIEVEMENT (Whakatututikanga):

Excellence, Creativity, Inquiry, Resilience

• RESPECT (Manaakitanga):

Consideration, Honesty, Integrity, Diversity

• EMPATHY (Ngakau Aroha):

Compassion, Kindness, Whānau, Gratitude

One Value is focused on each term starting with Confidence. The Values are emphasized and reinforced by teachers across the whole school and in School Assemblies. In the foyer of our Administration Block we have a C.A.R.E notice board, where the Value of the term is prominently displayed and examples of student work and how students have demonstrated the Value are displayed.

Parents are kept informed of the Value for each term, via newsletters and are encouraged to reinforce the Value at home. By doing this, we feel that both school and home have input into how our children become valued citizens.

• KILBIRNIE SCHOOL DONATION LETTER COMING HOME NEXT WEEK.

Each year we request a voluntary, tax deductible donation from the families of Kilbirnie School. As a state funded school, we receive an operations grant from the government. Formally we were a decile 10 school and received the lowest amount of operational funding per student that was available. The decile system has now been removed and replaced with a metric called the Equity Index. This has resulted in a further funding reduction for Kilbirnie School. We are also ineligible for the government "no donation" scheme. The amount we receive from the government is simply insufficient to allow us to offer the quality, broad-based curriculum that we aim to provide for our students.

We have two main methods of obtaining the funds needed to make up the shortfall – the fundraising work of the Parentlink group and the school donation. We have been extremely fortunate that at Kilbirnie School our community has always responded positively to the annual request for the donation as well as giving time and money to support the events run by Parentlink.

• KEA CROSSING AND ZEBRA CROSSING.

The kea crossing on Hamilton road is run by senior students with adult supervision. We roster parents on the Kea crossing to allow staff to supervise the zebra crossing on Moxham Avenue. Please email Soazik if you could help with a morning (8.40-9am) or afternoon (2.55-3.10pm) duty on the Kea crossing, stipulate the day or days you can do. The kea crossing can only operate with parent and whānau support. <u>soazik@kilbirnie.school.nz</u>


• AROUND THE SCHOOL.
