About Dennis

This painting was completed in 1992 when Dennis Knight Turner took up a sixmonth residency in his birthplace, Wanganui, offered by its public gallery The Sarjeant. Dennis Knight Turner was significant in the evolution of a distinctively Pacific modernism, along with his peers and close friends Theo Schoon and Gordon Walters, in the incorporation of both Maori and wider Melanesian/Oceanic motifs into modernist art works, from the 1950s. It was a major step forward, and had considerable influence on NZ artists who followed.

The image shown above is indicative of the work that will be exhibited. The piece has been generously donated to the school by Luit and Jan Bieringa. Please note that Denis Knight Turner watercolours on the market sell for \$1,400 unframed, tonight we are selling this work by auction and all proceeds of this sale will go the school.





About John

My most recent works have been papercuts and woodcuts inspired by proverbs. The proverbs come from David Crystal's book of collected proverbs from around the world "As They Say in Zanzibar". They range from poetic and profound through practical advice to silly and indecipherable.

The works begin as cut-paper drawings which are then translated to wood blocks. The two techniques are closely related with the non-printing/non-image areas being the areas cut away in both techniques. Woodcut also has the same sharp edge of graphic quality as the earlier papercuts but with the added possibilities of more layered colour and a freedom from the engineering problems of the papercuts where the lace-like parts of the papercut had to be connected for it to hold together as an image.

Dagmar Dyck is an Auckland based artist and teacher and the first woman of Tongan ancestry to graduate from ELAM School of Fine Arts at the University of Auckland in 1995. Dagmar works primarily in painting and printmaking and has created a large body of work that delves beneath the decorative surfaces of Tongan koloa (tangible and intangible wealth including material culture) to reveal her own unique hybrid iconography. Since 1993 she has exhibited her work extensively in New Zealand and abroad.

In 2014 Dagmar was awarded the prestigious Contemporary Pasifika Artist Award from Creative New Zealand. She is also one of the founding members of No'o Fakataha, an organisation formed to support, enhance and encourage Tongan arts and visual artists in and through the wider Auckland community. Since completing her Grad Dip in Teaching (Primary) in 2009 Dagmar has merged her skills and is passionate about empowering her students through the platform of the arts. Dagmar finds great satisfaction in her role as a teaching artist at Sylvia Park School in Mt Wellington, Auckland.

Characterised by a distinctively vibrant palette of aqua and green hues, a cast of lyrical hybrid characters and expressive brushwork, painter John Walsh has an established reputation in New Zealand.

His works are a solid fixture in many public and private collections throughout the country including the James Wallace Collection, Te Papa Tongarewa, the Sargeant Gallery Collection and the Jean Marie Tjibaou Cultural Centre Collection in Noumea, New Caledonia.

Despite not holding his first solo exhibition until he was almost 40, John Walsh quickly made a name for himself and now exhibits annually in Auckland, Wellington and Christchurch. Largely a self taught artist, Walsh attended Ilam School of Fine Arts, University of Canterbury.

In 1989, Walsh was invited to participate in an international mural project in New York and after returning to NZ, worked in a number of tertiary institutions. In 1993, he moved with his family to Wellington to an appointment as curator of contemporary Maori art at the National Art Gallery (now Te Papa) and it was around this time that he arrived at the artistic style for which he is so well-known now.

Lynda Lester is an American photographer living in Wellington. She received her formal photography training at the Brooks Institute of Photography in Santa Barbara, CA, USA. She moved to Wellington in 2009, and as her photography focuses on nature, she has found New Zealand to be an inspiring place to dwell. For her landscapes she uses early morning light to enhance form and long exposures to blur the water to achieve a peaceful image of the earth standing still with movement around it.

Lynda's photographs have been featured in numerous exhibitions in galleries and museums around the world, including Brazil, South Korea, USA and New Zealand. Most recently, Lynda has exhibited at Photospace Gallery and re.SPACE in Wellington, and is currently represented by iShen Gallery in Auckland.

In 2006-2007, Lynda and her photography were featured in a Nikon camera commercial airing throughout Europe. The commercial showed her capturing photographs in the field, as well as spotlighting her abstract photos. Her work has also been published in several calendars, books and posters featuring award-winning photographers.



About Max

It was his arrival in Wellington, New Zealand, in April 2006 that marked a profound change in Max Patté's life and work, best evidenced in his well known Solace In The Wind sculpture on the capital city's waterfront. Max describes this work and ones that followed as "emotional portraits" - inward looking and contemplative pieces that flow from his own decision to make the room and time in his life for his art. Some years on and his work can be found in private and public collections throughout the world.

Born and educated in Gloucestershire, England, in 1977, he studied at the Wimbledon School of Art in London (1997-2000), and was elected an associate of the Royal Society of British Sculptors in 2008. His skill with both animal and human form saw him embark on a successful career in film, television and theatre design. He has also worked internationally as a conservator of antiquities and contemporary art. Both of these career strands can be found in various forms within the work he now produces as an artist in his own right.
